On December 22, 2008, Ms Minh Tran Huy, a Vietnamese -French was awarded the Gironde literary Prize reserved for new writers in 2008. Born in 1979 in Paris, she is currently the assistanteditor of the Literary Maga-


zine. According to Aqui news, her book "The Princess and the Fisherman" weaves the legend of My Nuong and Truong Chi and her true love story with a Vietnamese male some 14 years earlier. Although the real-life love story was transient, she uses all the feelings she had experienced to build a fictitious story and to dig deeper into a Vietnam she would like to understand. The Gironde Prize, established in 1989, has a value of 7,600 Euros.



Kiem Nguyen - The Unwanted: A Memoir of Childhood

The son of a wealthy Vietnamese woman and an American businessman, Nguyen was nearly eight when Saigon fell to the Vietcong. For the next decade he and his family endured hardships brought on by the privileged lives they had enjoyed under the capitalist regime. Although his writing lacks the lyricism of recent memoirs like The Liar's Club or Angela's Ashes, Nguyen's voice is clear and strong, and he is adept at capturing both the broad sweep of life under the Vietcong and the peculiarities of growing up in a colorful and emotionally dysfunctional family during a jarring and vicious revolution. Perhaps the most engaging aspect of his memoir is its portrayal of the ironies that ensue when the old order collapses and the social hierarchy is turned upside down.

Robert Olen Butler: A Good Scent From a Strange Mountain

The Vietnam War continues to play itself out in fiction, autobiography, and history books, but no American author has captured the experiences of the Vietnamese themselves--and caught their voices --more tellingly than Robert Olen Butler, who won the Pulitzer Prize in 1993 for A Good Scent From a Strange Mountain. The 15 stories collected here, all written in the first person, blend Vietnamese folklore, the terrible, lingering memories of war, American pop culture and family drama.
