DR. & MRS. LONG NGUYEN MADE A \$5MILLION GIFT TO GEORGE MASON UNIVERSITY

Dr. Long Nguyen came to the U.S. in the mid-1960s, got a Masters degree in Physics and a Ph.D. in Computer Science at the University of Virginia. After successful careers at IBM and as Professor at Georgetown University, he founded and became President of Pragmatics in 1985.

Located in McLean, VA, Pragmatics--an Information Technology company --currently has 25 major information technology contracts with various defense and civilian agencies: the Departments of the Army, Health and Human Services, Homeland Security, Justice, State, and Treasury, and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation.

The \$5 million-endowment is used toward building a 16,000 square-meter complex at George Mason that will bear the name of Long and Kimmy Nguyen.



There's no easy way to tell the experiences of 1.5 million boat people that left Vietnam in years that followed the Fall of Saigon, but Khoa Do, director of The Finished People and Footy Legends, decided to tell it in one of the most difficult ways possible.

Mother Fish takes place almost entirely in a sewing factory. A small item in the factory triggers the traumatic memories of a lonely seamstress, and instantly the sewing factory is figuratively transformed in convincing fashion to resemble the journey of the woman's aquatic exodus. Some compare this film to the black-box theater style of Lars von Trier's Dogville, an apt comparison in subject matter, though Mother Fish is much more successful at accomplishing its goals.



LE THI DIEM THUY: THE GANGSTER WE ARE ALL LOOKING FOR

The narrator of Le's poetically spare but psychologically rich debut novel is only six when she and her father and four other Vietnamese men arrive in San Diego, thanks to a generous man who learned of the plight of Vietnamese boat people at church. Sadly, he dies before they arrive, leaving his widow and reluctant son to care for the refugees, an arrangement that ends with the sort of disaster only a lonely and imaginative child can create. Her mother was left behind in the confusion of their dangerous escape, and she also misses her dead older brother.

There is much pain in this exquisite novel, and much beauty.



TO NU JACK FRUIT



Legend has it that a beautiful girl once died broken hearted.

Close to her grave grew a tree that bore delicious fruit.

Villagers gathered the seeds, planted them, and called the tree "To Nu Jack fruit tree."

The To Nu jackfruit flesh has the sweetest and most crunchy taste of all the jackfruit.

The jackfruit tree is native of South and Southeastern Asian tropical countries. It is now found in East Africa and Brazil. It is the largest tree-borne-fruit in the world reaching 80 pounds (36 kg) and 20 inches (50 cm) in diameter.



WINERY IN PHAN RANG, VIETNAM



People are not exactly sure when grape business began in Phan Rang, central Vietnam, but vineyards can be seen three miles outside the city. Grapes certainly like the burning hot weather and the salty atmosphere of central Vietnam. Wine making is really simple in that area and bottles of local wine are sold along highways.
